2018 Addition to Ringneck Marsh Wildlife Area

By the time you read this, the CCCB will have completed the acquisition of an 80-acre parcel of land next to the existing Ringneck Marsh Wildlife Area. Ringneck Marsh is a 260-acre public hunting property that is located about 5 miles northwest of the town of Calamus. With this addition, 340 acres will be available to area sportsmen and nature lovers. The wildlife area lies in the Wapsipinicon River floodplain and is primarily comprised of native grassland shallow wetlands and floodplain timber. It's close proximity to the Wapsipinicon River corridor makes it a real outdoors paradise that a wide range of wildlife calls home. It is near Mockridge Wildlife Preserve and Syracuse Wildlife management Area as well as hundreds of acres of privately owned wildlife habitat.

Game species such as whitetail deer, raccoon, beaver, mink, otter and even an occasional pheasant can be found there. A variety of waterfowl including mallards, wood duck, Canada geese and others are also found on the property. Non-game species like the sandhill crane, great blue heron, trumpeter swan and bald eagles call the area home. The rare Blandings turtle, east-central newt and the ornate box turtle also are known to frequent the area.

Long-term plans for the new addition include converting the 35 acres of croplands into shallow wetlands and native grasses. The remaining acres include 32 acres of floodplain timber and a 13 acre meadow. Signs will go up as soon as weather allows and a small parking area will be built.

The Conservation Board has been working on this acquisition for almost two years now. With most of the land in Clinton County being intensively farmed, it can be very difficult to find a sizable piece of land for hunting. As a state, Iowa ranks 47^{th} in the amount of public lands.

This project has been funded by a wildlife habitat grant from the Iowa DNR and donations from Whitetails Unlimited, Pheasants Forever, Mississippi Valley Sportsmen and the Clinton County Community Development Association. The Iowa Natural Heritage Foundation and the Clinton County Conservation Foundation were also instrumental in the acquisition of the property.

Two of our Conservation staff also deserve the lion's share of the kudos on this project, Park Officer, Chip Brown got all the groups on board to put up the money needed for the purchase and Resource Technician, Darin Voss worked with Chip to write the grants.

2017 "Building Better Birders" Class & Cruise

During the spring season of 2017, the Clinton County Conservation Board (CCCB) Education Staff developed an idea high of 72 species to train better birders and possibly develop a core group of new citizen scientists, by conducting "beginning birder cruises" in the wooded backwaters of the Mississippi River at Rock Creek Park on the Blue Heron pontoon boat. The hope was that participants in this program would get involved in various "citizen science" projects (e.g. Christmas Bird Count, Statewide Spring Bird Count, etc.). The program was funded in-kind by CCCB (\$1,575) along with a grant from the Iowa Ornithologists' Union (\$750). The cruises were co-led by Mark Roberts (CCCB) who served as a birding guide and boat pilot, as well as Kelly McKay (BioEco Research and Monitoring Center) who was involved as the primary birding guide and instructor.



Originally, six cruises were planned during the summer breeding season of 2017, alternating between Saturday and Wednesday mornings (June 10 & 21, July 8 & 19, 5 and August 5 & 16). Eventually, we added two additional cruises during the fall migration season (September 13 & 27). Cruises began shortly after sunrise (6:30-7:00 AM) and lasted anywhere from 2.5 to 5.0 hours, depending on availability of the boat as well as interest from the participants. Furthermore, participants had the option of birding on foot throughout the park with Kelly for an additional hour or two after the cruise.

Overall, 83 people participated on the 8 cruises (slightly over 10 per trip) with a low of 5 participants on Trip 1 (June 10) to a high of 16 participants on Trips 4 and 6 (July 19 and August 16). During these 8 cruises a cumulative total of 105 species were identified, ranging from a low of



7 species (September 27) to a (September 13). This produced an average of nearly 60 species per cruise. Approximately half of the species (52) were observed on 6 or more of the



trips, while 28 species were encountered on all 8 cruises. During these birding cruises, 10 species of waterfowl and other waterbirds were reported along with 6 species each of raptors and shorebirds and all 7 species of woodpeckers (red-headed, pileated, flicker, yellow-bellied sapsucker, red-bellied, hairy and downy) occurring in Iowa. Furthermore, these trips yielded 8 species of flycatchers, 5 species each of vireos, thrushes, and blackbirds, as well as a notable 17 species of warblers. Highlight species encountered in noteworthy abundances included: wood duck, yellow-billed cuckoo, spotted sandpiper, doublecrested cormorant, turkey vulture, bald eagle, red-headed woodpecker, pileated woodpecker, eastern wood-pewee, great crested flycatcher, yellow-throated vireo, red-eyed vireo, tree swallow, northern rough-winged swallow, brown creeper, house wren, prothonotary warbler, American redstart and Baltimore oriole.

The whole trip series was fraught with worries. Whenever you schedule a series like this you run the risk of it not attracting a crowd the first couple of outings and now you are stuck following through with the rest of the scheduled events. Luckily we had a small but enthusiastic following from the very start. The people were really interested in birding and becoming better birders. This fueled our whole series and inspired Kelly and myself to continue into the fall and hopefully next year. Of course the biggest fear is over sleeping. It turns out it is far easier to say you will meet at 6 AM at the boat ramp than it is to actually do that when the time comes! Astoundingly, all the trips took off on schedule. Another pesky worry is poor weather hurting your turnout. I must say we had the most spectacular weather for every one of our days. Low wind, sunshine and lots of birds! Lastly, scheduling a birding event with people does not guarantee the birds are going to show up. That was never a problem as you can see from Kelly's report.

Although we believe this first-time effort at "beginning birder cruises" was a success, illustrated by the fact that several people participated on multiple trips, the definitive proof of success for this program will be demonstrated by the involvement of participants on various "citizen science" programs in the future. We are hopeful that additional years of this program may produce a reliable source of citizen scientists throughout the local area.

Cavity Nesters of Clinton County

We have a great mix of furry and feathered creatures to brighten our seasons. If you haven't put up feeders in your backyard habitat yet there's still time. Many of the same animals we feed will be looking for a place to raise their young next spring. A good number of those are cavity nesters. In a wilderness, they find dead limbs or old snags to excavate their nest cavity in or use an old hole. Trouble is we don't like dead limbs or trees threatening to fall on our heads or property so we cut them down. "Ooops!" there goes another cavity condominium.

We can compensate for this by building artificial nest cavities. Some animals need special habitat that you might or might not be able to provide them. You'll want to know what types of animals you can expect to visit and how and where to place their boxes. Clinton County Conservation is pleased to offer all this as well as kits ranging from \$5-\$20 each.

Box 1/\$5/Wrens/White-footed or Prairie Mice ~ If you build it they will come. *House wrens* begin nesting in May. Attach their box to a building, tree, pole or leave it free hanging. Place them 5-10' above the ground, 100' apart. *Prairie and white-footed mice* can be interesting to observe in your yard. Boxes should be placed 3-4' above the ground. The entry hole should face east or southeast.

Box 2 /\$5/White-breasted Nuthatches/Prothonotary Warblers White-breasted nuthatches are found in woodlands, near open areas and water. They begin nesting in May. Put 1" of wood shavings in the box and placed it with its back to the prevailing wind 5-20' from the ground and 1000' apart. Prothonotary warblers breed in floodplain forests and swamps and nesting begins in April. Place boxes in shade within 16' of or over standing or slow-moving water. Over water they should face land 10-20' from the shore, 4-12' above the high water level and 235' apart.

Box 3 /\$5/Black-capped Chickadees These birds prefer woodlots, shelter belts and nearby yards. Nesting begins in April. Place an inch of sawdust in the box then place its back to the prevailing wind in 40-60 % sunlight. Mount them 5-15' from the ground and 650' apart.

Box 4/\$5/Tree Swallows/Eastern Bluebirds Tree swallows nest in marshes, meadows and wooded swamps beginning in May. Place boxes on poles 5-6' high and space them 35' apart. Face the hole towards an open field from the northeast to southwest. They favor long uncut grass and line their nest with feathers. Bluebirds begin nesting in April. Their boxes should be placed facing east in meadows or open woods, 4-6' off the ground and 300' apart.

Box 5/\$5/Great Crested Flycatcher Flycatchers nest in open woodlands, towns and along rivers beginning in May. Give the box an unobstructed flight path along a woodland edge in partial sun. You may use a post or tree and mount it about 3-20' high. To keep out starlings and sparrows you can hang it from a 3-4' wire.



Box 6 /\$5/Robins/Barn Swallows/Eastern Phoebes

Robins begin nesting in May. Their platforms are mounted on posts 5-25' high and on buildings just below the eaves in plain site. *Barn swallows* begin nesting in May using mud nests attached to vertical surfaces and prefer meadows near water. Place under the eaves 7-12' high. Multiple platforms can be placed as near as 5' apart. Swallows must have mud and you can make a puddle for them. *Eastern phoebes* begin nesting in April and prefer sites in an open woodland with water nearby. Place the platform on a building close to the eave from 3-6' high and 165' apart.

Box 7 /\$20/American Kestrels/Eastern Screech Owls Kestrels prefer to nest in grasslands and open woodlands beginning in March. Attach their nest boxes to buildings, posts or lone trees under a limb 10-30' high facing northeast to southwest and no closer than 1/2 mile apart. Add 3" of wood shavings to the box. Eastern screech owls nest in open woodlands, forests and towns beginning in March. Their boxes can be attached under a limb of a live tree at the woodlands edge or from poles 10-30' high and 100' apart. Add 2-3" of wood shavings to the box. Wait a week if not two after finding a nest to check the contents.

Box 8 /\$20/Flying Squirrels Place the box in woodlands from 10-26' high so it faces opposite the prevailing wind. You can attract *southern flying squirrels* by placing nuts on a dimly lit feeding platform (the squirrels won't mind) and watch for them after dark.

Box 9 /\$20/Bats Our bats prefer to hunt insects over water so their boxes are best placed near it. Bat houses should be mounted 12-15' high. Choose a sunny location on the south or east side of a building or on a pole. Bat houses work best with at least 6-8 hours of direct sunlight. Black paint or a tar paper rap may be needed for additional heat absorption and boxes should be in place by April.

Box 10 /\$20/Wood duck/Hooded Merganser Wood ducks & hooded mergansers both nest in forests and marshes near water. On land, choose a site within 100' of and face their boxes toward the water or place them over the water and attach them to poles or posts from 6-30' high and no closer than 600' apart near, or over water. Place 4" of wood shavings in the box.


