TRACKS & TRAILS

Finding myself with time for things I would probably never Are all trails safe? Your drive is a type of have gotten to do otherwise, I have taken on the task of mapping our existing trails and laying tracks where additional trails might be useful. Some may question the importance of this. I'm taking this opportunity to lay out my feelings, hopes and the practicalities of this work.

Trails are a practical and an important component of any conservation area, commonly used by animals and people. A well defined trail makes traveling easier, faster and safer. This concept is not lost on even the simplest of legged creatures. I often leave the more developed trails in my wanderings. Heck I have a t-shirt with the word interstate-aphobia on it, a very appropriate term for my wandering ways. I often find myself following game trails, ducking under brush and pushing through tall grass. Not the easiest of paths and by no means the fastest, I'm always glad to rejoin a developed trail when I have exerted myself.

There have also been times when I started down a developed trail with a lack of prior knowledge and found myself turning back due to fatigue, time constraints or lack of provisions. Even the best of trails are better if one has a map or at least accurate, well placed wayfinding signage.

Imagine yourself casually walking a trail thinking how lovely the pond your passing is and how nice it is that someone has placed a wood duck nest box there. Wait! Didn't I just pass this place 20 minutes ago? Am I lost? It's getting dark! Has this ever happened to you? It has happened to me while hunting squirrels at Sherman Park. Worse yet, think how you'd feel just a half mile into some seldom traveled area with a sudden injury or ailment. You may have your cell phone to call for help, but what if help can't get to you easily or is delayed by the difficulty of finding you. Every autumn I hear some story of a hunter falling from a tree stand or being shot. Are they going to need help? Would it be better if help got there sooner than later? Worse case situations I know, but they do happen. We responsible for our own actions, but when in public places we expect it to be <u>reasonably</u> maintained.

trail and if you think your not taking on some risk pulling out of your garage you might want to think again. Would you buy a vehicle with no mirrors or tail lights on



it? No, we take precautions and do our best to be safe. How many of us would ever be caught dead without our phones? Well don't count me, lol. I also go off without a map, compass or GPS at times and I have paid the price a time or two. You should use these things whenever. What would driving be like without road signs? These are practical and essential to any road system and a trail is a road of sorts.

Here is an example (upper, right) of a sign you might see on a trail. What is this telling us? Obviously this is the easiest trail in a designated area. But just what is easy? It is completely relative to prospective; meaning different things to different people. Does it tell us how much climbing we'll do or how steep a slope is? Does it tell us how long the trail is, what the surface is like or what we might find along the way? I want to know these things especially now that I am a senior. I've always said that most people can walk most trails. It's simply a matter of pacing yourself and being prepared. How does somebody telling me "it's easy" help me accomplish that?

I think you'll agree with me that the sign at the bottom of the page says a whole lot more. We're on the main trail and it's just .2 miles (2 city blocks) long. We can scan the QR code with our phone for a map. It's downhill for 61 feet and back up 1 foot. The arrow indicates what's called an "out-n-back" and its green because it leads to other trails. Yes, we will have to come back up the 61 feet when we return. The lime green area is the trails profile showing it's rise and fall. The hike will be on a gravel surface, with hills, bluffs and a bridged creek.

It's work to collect all this data and costs dollars to maintain trails plus to produce and place signs. If it saves a life or just gives hikers more confidence, making outings more pleasant, I say it's worth it. Go take a hike! Really, HIKE!

In earlier issues of "The Heron" I wrote articles looking back into my own history here with Clinton County Conservation. I have decided to make a series of my "Greatest Hits". I also hope to get some great music playing in your head like the lyrics to American Pie by Don McLean.

4. Nature Gallery, Mississippi River Eco Tourism Center ~ More than a decade ago, I and the rest of the Clinton County Conservation Education Team were tasked with envisioning what the Nature Gallery in the new Eco Tourism Center would look like and what a task it was too!

We asked ourselves many questions...

- ♦ What messages do we want to convey?
- ♦ What role will live animals play?
- ♦ How can we make the displays interactive?
- ♦ What can we build in-house?
- What will have to be custom-built by others?
- ♦ How much will it cost? Can we afford it?
- Can we care for the displays long term?

All these while keeping in mind traffic flow, accessibility and creating displays that will still be relevant far into the future.

Wildlife Habitats. We definitely wanted to showcase the importance of habitats and the wildlife of the Mississippi River at Rock Creek. It would be the anchor for our message. We decided to focus on four major displays.

- A. **Deep Water Habitat:** Our 8,000 gallon aquarium is large enough to be home to a wide variety of river fish. It was important that the fish be on the larger side, at least "keeper" size. Seeser Crane Service was responsible for moving in the aquarium on a hair-raising day! (pic on back page)
- B. **Backwater Habitat:** The *Turtle Island* display features life in and around the quiet backwater sloughs of the river. The crawl under acrylic tube really allows visitors to feel a part of the habitat. The beaver lodge, bobcat den, nesting turtles and live snake enclosures round out the backwater scene. A nice addition was the *Touch Tank* we acquired courtesy of the National Mississippi River Museum in Dubuque.

- C. **Snag Habitat:** Standing dead and hollow trees provide homes and food for many of our wildlife species that call the floodplain forest home. Our *Giant Cottonwood* is based on Iowa's largest, that resides near Welton, IA. Kids can explore the 8-foot diameter tree by climbing up inside, learning about wildlife on the way. This display was built by our Rangers Brad Taylor and Ryan Waltz and artist Susan Holgersson of Rock Island.
- D. Riverbank Habitat: Our Riverbank display creates the illusion of ducking under and seeing where critters live, like flathead catfish and muskrats. The display is home to several live animal specimens and features sand prairie habitat spots along the rivers edge. This was also built by our Park Rangers and Susan Holgersson.
- E. **360° Wildlife Mural:** We wanted to give the feeling of being outdoors, not being within the confines of a building. The answer was a huge mural with over 70 species of wildlife depicted in their natural habitat. Susan Holgersson was again employed to create this masterpiece of art. She even painted animals of Iowa's past in the clouds on the ceiling.

Changing up the displays. We knew going in, that once the major displays of the Nature Gallery were completed, we would need to use them for a long time, even as the fish and wildlife on display needed to be flexible.

We decided to use our classroom area as a changing display room. Over the years it has housed displays on Iowa's prairies, snakes, fish and furbearers. Our next reincarnation will be devoted entirely to birds, opening this spring. Naturalist Chuck Jacobsen is taking the lead on this project.

Other education areas in the Eco Tourism Center include:

- A. **Iowa's State Record Fish Collection.** This one-of-a-kind display "swims" overhead in the Camp Store. The 37 species of fish represent Iowa's all-time largest!
- B. **Shooting Range.** In the basement we have created a versatile shooting range for both archery and air rifles. Kevlar curtains stop arrows & pellets cold and the windowless room makes a safe place for kids to practice skills. We also teach Atlatl, Tomahawk and Slingshot!
- C. Field Trip Picnic Shelter. Under the Eco Center is a great venue for our large groups to gather. The Clinton County Conservation Foundation provided funding for concrete floors electricity and overhead lighting to make this spot very useful. We even added a 6 faucet handwashing station so lunch-time is safe and clean.

2020 "BEGINNING BIRDER CRUISES" AT ROCK CREEK PARK!

During 2020, Clinton County Conservation continued the "Beginning Birder Cruises" Program at Rock Creek Park on their Blue Heron pontoon boat. This past year we increased the number of cruises from 8 to 11, including one evening cruise. Once again, these birding cruises were offered free to the public during the summer breeding and fall migration seasons. Participants were taken on a guided cruise through the labyrinth of wooded backwater sloughs of the Mississippi River at Rock Creek Park. The cruises were co-led by Mark Roberts, Interpretive Naturalist, who served as a birding guide and boat pilot, as well as Kelly McKay (BioEco Research and Monitoring Center) who was involved as the primary birding guide and instructor.

This year the river experienced heavy flooding in the spring, followed by minor flooding during the early summer months. Relatively normal to lower water levels characterized much of the late summer and fall seasons. The number of participants on the 2020 cruises ranged from a low of 1 to a

high of 11. Overall, 77 total participants took part in the 11 cruises (an average of 7.0 per trip).

Four cruises occurred during the summer breeding season (June 2nd, 13th and July 7th, 18th), while the other seven occurred during the fall migration season (August 8th, 19th, September 2nd, 9th, 15th, October 27th and November 7th). Cruises began shortly after sunrise (6:30-7 AM) and lasted 2.25-7.75 hours, depending on availability of the boat and interest of the participants. Furthermore, everyone had the option of birding on foot throughout the park with Kelly for an additional hour or two after each cruise. Overall, 48.25 hours were logged in on the birding cruises in 2020, producing an average of 4.4 hours per trip.

The 2020 birding cruises identified an amazing 128 species, ranging from a low of 46 species (September 15th) to a high of 85 species (September 9th). This resulted in an average of 59 species per cruise.

This diverse avifauna included: 13 species of waterfowl and other water birds, 8 species of shorebirds and 7 raptors, as well as all 7 woodpecker species occurring in Iowa. Additionally, these cruises produced 9 species of flycatchers, 4 vireos, all 6 swallow species occurring in Iowa, 3 wrens, 6 thrushes, 4 finches, 6 sparrows, 5 blackbirds and an impressive 21 warblers.

Some of the noteworthy species encountered included: Bufflehead, Piedbilled Grebe, Yellowbilled Cuckoo, Common Nighthawk, Rufous Hummingbird, Sora, Wilson's Snipe, Spotted and Solitary Sandpipers, Lesser and Greater Yellowlegs, Bald Eagle, Redshouldered Hawk, Redheaded and Pileated Woodpeckers, Peregrine

Falcon, Great Crested and Acadian Flycatchers, Eastern Kingbird, Yellow-throated and Red-eyed Vireos, Tree and Northern Rough-winged Swallows, Purple Martin, Redbreasted Nuthatch, Brown Creeper, Carolina Wren, Bluegray Gnatcatcher, Golden-crowned and Ruby-crowned Kinglets, Veery, Gray-cheeked and Swainson's Thrushes, Purple Finch, Pine Siskin, Baltimore Oriole, Rusty Blackbird, Scarlet Tanager, Rose-breasted Grosbeak and Indigo Bunting.

Additionally, several notable warblers were observed such as: Ovenbird, Goldenwinged Warbler, Bluewinged Warbler, Blackand-white Warbler, Prothonotary Warbler, American Redstart, Northern Parula, Bay-breasted Warbler, Black-throated Green Warbler and Canada Warbler.

During 2020, 15 species were observed on all 11 cruises (Wood Duck, Killdeer, Double-crested Cormorant, Bald Eagle, Downy Woodpecker,

Hairy Woodpecker, Blue Jay, Black-capped Chickadee, White-breasted Nuthatch, American Robin, House Sparrow, American Goldfinch, Red-winged Blackbird, Common Grackle and Northern Cardinal), with an additional 6

species reported on all but one cruise (Great Blue Heron, Belted Kingfisher, Red-bellied Woodpecker, European Starling, Song Sparrow and Brown-headed Cowbird).

We would like to thank everyone who participated on the 2020 Beginning Birder Cruises. We hope to offer cruises in 2021!

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
