Living Outdoors Series ~ The Sunshine Vitamin "D"

When I was diagnosed with squamous skin cancer, the dermatologist mentioned the use of sunblock like they always do and the lengths that she goes to avoid the sun completely. like wearing gloves and a neck gator when she is driving because of her fair Scandinavian skin. I politely listened and took note of her very nice complexion. I thought to myself and should have asked her up-front, "what about vitamin D?" As I knew that "D" is important because I have been interested in health and wellness since my teenage years: so important that I even wondered about my dermatologist's underlying health and how I was going to get enough of the sun vitamin even when I was completely covered with sunscreen and clothing most of the time. Then I asked how my underlying health was as my immune system couldn't kill these mutated skin cells. So, as any good research starts, I asked myself the 5 W's (and H) on the big

"D". What it really is, Who needs it, Why is it important (its actually more than important, its essential), Where we get it, When do we get it and How much do we need?


much do we need?
Vitamin D is also known as the sun vitamin or what I'm going to call,

"D". Guess what, it really isn't a vitamin, it is a prohormone! Since I do not want to bore you, I am going to be very simple about it....by absorbing sunlight through our skin, a chemical reaction occurs, making a substance that then goes to our kidney to convert to another kind of substance that our liver makes into an active hormone. People have "D" receptors in nearly every cell of their body and it affects many different processes.

The most known and important job of "D" is that it helps absorb and distribute calcium throughout the body, making strong bones in children and keeping strong bones in adults. Recently, a growing amount of evidence suggests this vitamin is essential in fighting infections, including the common cold. Along with playing a part in fatigue and muscle weakness, low "D" has been correlated to developing long-term illnesses (diabetes, multiple sclerosis, etc), cancer, cardiovascular disease, obesity and even mental illnesses. What is alarming is that we as a society are becoming more sedentary with an inside lifestyle. Add a little fear of the sun because of skin cancer and we as a society, are becoming more and more "D" deficient, all the while these terrible diagnoses are increasing!

When skin is exposed to intense sun, the body is stimulated into producing more melanin (skin pigment), resulting in inflammation to protect the skin against adverse UV radiation, producing a tan or burn. Fair skinned people like myself, may have less melanin and a different type of melanin than darker complected people. Darker complected people have more melanin and therefore do not burn as easily, but the additional melanin, also does not allow them to absorb as much "D." As a result they need to be exposed to longer times in the sun to obtain the same amount of "D." This can cause issues because here in Iowa, as we do not get enough

UVB rays to produce "D" October through March. UVB rays have a hard time getting through the atmosphere. Therefore you do not start to absorb "D" until the angle of the sun is at least 50° or more above the horizon



During the winter you have to rely on your diet to get you through. Hopefully you like fatty fish because "D" is found in salmon, tuna, herring, mackerel, sardines and halibut. Eggs are also a good source, especially if the chickens were pasture raised with lots of sun and had a good diet. As we have all heard, you are what you eat! Mushrooms (especially wild) are also a good way to obtain "D" even though it isn't the more absorbable animal derived D3. Many foods; like milk, cereal and orange juice are commercially fortified in many of the foods people eat to reduce vitamin deficiencies. Then there are supplements.

Supplements are to supplement your already good diet. So if the food you are eating is not healthy, start there first. As supplements can be tricky with dubious ingredients, questionable absorption along with inaccurate dosages. If you google vitamin D intake, it shows anywhere from 400-4000 IU's being recommended. Remember, supplements depend on your diet, sun exposure and melanin. So it is always best to get blood work done and communicate with a knowledgeable person to get your blood levels to an ideal level, which again is confusing. With 20 ng/mL being minimum, 30-50 ng/mL is recommended, with some even suggesting 80-100 ng/mL.

So where does that leave us? To try our best. Eat healthy at least 80% of the time. Cover or apply Environmental Health Group (EWG) approved sunscreen to commonly



exposed skin. Download your "dminder" app and expose your lighter skin to the sun in the middle of day for however long the app suggests. If you have chronic health conditions or you just don't feel right, consider getting your "D" measured and work with someone to see if supplements could help you out.

Keep living outdoors, it is what living things are made to do.

Bringing Back the Shade at Rock Creek

The dead and dying trees at Rock Creek Marina & Campground have been a constant topic of interest for the past couple of years. Due to extensive flooding and the infamous *Derecho*, park staff have had to remove hundreds of trees throughout the campground. If you had driven through the park in March, you would have questioned if the campground would have been able to be open to the public this summer, but after many hours of chainsaw work and stump grinding, the campground is looking good, a little sunny...but good.

With more work to be done, the Conservation Staff and the Clinton County Conservation Foundation are partnering up to replenish the tree life throughout the park through the Derecho Community Forest Grant Program provided by the Iowa Department of Natural Resources. According to the IDNR, the Derecho Community Forestry Grant Program provides reimbursable grants ranging from \$500 to \$5,000 to be used for the purchase and planting of trees suitable to Iowa on publicly owned lands. Qualifying public planting lands include, but are not limited to, street right-of-way's, parks, school grounds, courthouse lawns, public buildings, fairgrounds, cemeteries, libraries and trails. Award recipients are required to provide a dollar-for-dollar cash match

for purchase of trees and materials from Iowa businesses. The grant has been submitted by the Conservation Department and

we will receive word on September 1st if awarded.

If accepted, several tree species such as Burr Oak, Swamp White Oak, River Birch and Kentucky Coffee, will be added to the park with the help of the Conservation Foundation to meet that match. In order to support this cause, the Clinton County Conservation Foundation is holding a "Hog Wild Raffle" to help earn funds to replenish the tree life at Rock Creek. In 2020, Kelly McKay, Mark Roberts and Brian Ritter began presenting Building Better Birders and Citizen Scientists Workshops throughout Iowa. These workshops are free and open to the public, and are funded through a grant from the Iowa Resource Enhancement and Protection Conservation Education Program (REAP-CEP). The workshops are tailored to meet the needs of the individual host counties. Offered programming ranges from bird identification and research presentations, to bird hikes and owl prowls, as well as other presentations provided by the counties themselves. Through August 2021, 79 workshops have been conducted in 26 counties across Iowa.

Within the REAP-CEP grant proposal, we established two goals involving public participation. First, we hoped to reach 900 total participants during the 100 scheduled workshops. This represents the average number of participants encountered during the "Rock Creek Park Beginning Birding Cruises," as well as the "Nahant Marsh Beginning Birding Tours," which were the precursors to this workshop series. Furthermore, we were hopeful that during each workshop, participants would take part in at least three programming sessions. Therefore, our second goal was to have contact with 2,700 cumulative participants. To date, the workshops have exceeded expectations, impressive considering the COVID-19 pandemic restrictions enacted last year. With 21 workshops remaining through February 2022, we have reached 1,304 total participants (exceeding our first goal by 404), and have recorded 2,136 cumulative

attendees (on pace for achieving our second goal)!

One of the project's missions is to encourage public participation in citizen science programs. Data collected during the various bird hike and owl prowl workshop sessions are being reported to the Iowa Ornithologists' Union in seasonal field note reports. During the first 79 workshops, 790 workshop attendees have taken part in citizen science through their participation in one or more of the 83 bird hikes and 15 owl prowls conducted. At this point, participants have identified 216 bird species! Additionally, the Building Better Birders and Citizen Scientists Workshops have to date conducted 74 bird identification and 20 avian research, as well as 18 miscellaneous presentations.

With 21 workshops remaining, it's not too late to catch a bird ID presentation or go on a hike for owls or other birds. There really is something for everyone. Past workshops have provided bird identification presentations to help participants identify a wide variety of birds. Workshop attendees have enjoyd live bird presentations and taken part in sessions involving building bird houses or bird feeders.



Picture Yourself on a Boat on a River....

In earlier issues of *The Heron*, I wrote articles looking back into my own history here with Clinton County Conservation. This has led me to make a series of my top eleven greatest hits. Hang in there, we are almost to the end!

#2. Blue Heron Eco Cruises ~ In the late 1990s, a few years after we acquired Rock Creek Marina & Campground, a new thought began rattling around my head. The idea was to acquire a vehicle to take field trip students out on the main channel and backwaters of the Mississippi River. The idea kind of came to me in phases.

First, I kept noticing that during field trips to the new park, students were not latching on to the concept that we were studying the Mississippi River. Since all you can see are shallow, narrow sloughs around the park, the fact that we were on the 4th largest river on earth was just an abstract concept. The backwaters look more like a farm pond rather than a small part of a complex river system.

Second, I chanced upon a solution while vacationing with my family on Florida's Gulf Coast. Madeira Beach is home to *Dolphin Watching Cruise and Eco Tours*, we took the Sunset Cruise! The vessel used is an over-sized pontoon called "The Big Blue Boat!" The boat takes passengers around Boca Ciega Bay looking at wildlife from dolphins to pelicans. If this sounds familiar, it should, it serves as the template for our program. I said to my wife, "This is great, why can't we do this on our river?"

That guiding thought kept spinning around my head. What we needed was a school bus for the river. It needed to be big enough to take out an entire class at once, stable enough to handle excited students, tough enough to handle the river sand, logs, currents and waves and fast enough to get out to the channel and back in an hour.

I did my research, came up with preliminary costs and pitched the idea to the then Executive Director, Al Griffiths. Al was always open to new ideas and really liked the idea that our Conservation Department would have this, unique to Iowa, education asset. I then pitched the idea to the Conservation Board and came up against some realities. How could we fund it? Will it be popular? How can we pay for fuel, repairs and new motors? They sent me on a mission to answer these questions and more. That is also when the working title of "Mark's Party Barge" was born.

While I had no problem with the question of it's popularity with schools, the money issues were daunting. The best answer was a *Clinton County Gaming Association* grant (today's *Clinton County Development Association*). This grant, if successful, would fund 75% of the purchase cost of the pontoon, motor, trailer and associated equipment. That left me with 25% to conjure up and I still needed the answers to the upkeep and fuel questions.

To fund the latter two issues I came up with the idea of offering Sunset Cruises to the public on Thursday evenings for \$5 per passenger. We also would offer private group cruises for \$125 a pop. Basically, charging for these cruises would supply enough cash to cover the rest of the oper-



The Original Blue Heron Eco Cruiser, 20 Years Ago. ating costs (fuel, maintenance and a new motor every three years), so field trips could cruise with no cost to schools.

The last big hurdle was getting the 25% cost share. I wrote letters to every group I could imagine and made many follow-up phone calls. The result was I found seven organizations that were willing to pledge money to fund the dream.

The Conservation Board agreed to fund the remainder if the grant proved successful. Well, we hit on the grant and we were off to the races! The next several months were busy ordering the boat, a 30-passenger tri-toon Odyssey with a 150 hp engine, PFDs, depth finder, dock and all the safety equipment we would need onboard. We also custom built our own bench seats and installed them on the boat.

Over the years we eliminated charges for the public cruises and had to quit private cruises all together due to Coast Guard regulations, but the program has endured and thrived. We bought a bigger, better custom boat in 2010 from Clark Boats in Bellevue that sported two 115 hp Mercury engines, again with a grant from the *Clinton County Development Association*. The Conservation Foundation is purchasing two new engines this winter for the Blue Heron. Please support their efforts, see page 3:)

In September, 2002 we took out our first official Blue Heron Eco Cruise. It was during a statewide Conservation Board Conference we were hosting. Since that first cruise we have averaged over 200 trips per each of 20 years! We have taken over 92,000 passengers on over 4,000 cruises!


