ORDINANCE 2024-03

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE MAP OF THE CLINTON COUNTY ZONING ORDINANCE RELATIVE TO THE ZONING DESIGNATION OF CERTAIN PROPERTY LOCATED IN SECTION 15, TOWNSHIP 81 NORTH, RANGE 5 EAST OF THE 5TH P.M. IN CLINTON COUNTY, IOWA

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CLINTON COUNTY BOARD OF SUPERVISORS:

Section 1: The zoning district boundaries of the County of Clinton Iowa are herewith changed so as to provide for the change of the following described property: See Exhibit "A"

within the A-1 (Prime Agricultural) District of Clinton County, Iowa to M-1 (Limited Industrial).

Section 2: The change as hereinabove set forth shall be entered and made part of the zoning map of the County of Clinton, Iowa, which map is made part of the Zoning Ordinance of the County of Clinton, Iowa, by incorporation therein as set forth in Chapter III, Section 3.2 of the said Clinton County Zoning Ordinance, and the Chairperson of the Board of Supervisors in accord with Chapter III, Section 3.2.3 shall promptly note on said map the Ordinance numbers, nature of change and date of change.

Section 3: If any section, provision or part of this Ordinance shall be adjudged to be invalid or unconstitutional, such adjudication shall not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole or any section, provision or part thereof not adjudged invalid or unconstitutional.

Section 4: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its adoption and publication as required by law.

DEPARTMENT HEADS, ELECTED OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES

County Auditor Eric Van Lancker reminded the Board of the fiscal year budget hearing at 11 a.m. next Monday.

County Treasurer Dustin Johnson reported his office in DeWitt will be open five-days a week starting today.

DISCUSSION WITH POSSIBLE ACTION

County Support Request for the City of Grand Mound CAT Grant: Chairman Irwin said Grand Mound has applied for a CAT Grant. Melissa Conner, Grand Mound city clerk, said the grant is to fund a splash pad and the city is currently raising funds for the installation of the water park. She said there has been a lot of updates to the city's park area including lighting on the walking trail. She said people from other communities are also coming to Grand Mound to use the park amenities. She asked the County for 10-20% of the project, but their goal is just to qualify for the grant. She said the County contribution could be as low as \$500. She said the fundraising is currently at 69% of the project cost. She said the CAT Grant would like to see 70% or more of the project raised. Supervisor Srp doesn't want to restrict their ability to apply for a grant. He said if the County could do a smaller amount to help attract more funding, he would like to do that. Van Lancker said the community matching funds budget line is currently in the red and the line was not funded for next year. Van Lancker said the line has been used for purposes as this for assistance of up to \$5,000. Srp suggested a County contribution of \$1,000. The Board agreed to consider next week a resolution to commit \$1,000.

Clinton County Student Loan Assistance Program: County HR Director Alexandria Ellison said a recent survey showed county employees would see it as a positive for the County to offer the student loan program to employees of the County, but the number of who would take advantage of it is not clear. Irwin said he's not prepared to change how the County program is currently administered. Srp said this is a tough time to have this conversation about this benefit. Srp also had questions about if a degree is needed for the position an employee is at. He said the area the County has with the worst turnover is more about the environment of industry than student loan debt. Srp said he would talk about it again in the future, but now is not the best time. Supervisor George agreed with positions previously stated by Srp and Irwin. Ellison said she doesn't believe the \$30 a month is impactful for retention. She said the incentives in the health benefits are more impactful.

County Administration Building Project Update: Irwin and Van Lancker recommended the Board move its Monday meeting locations for May to the County Satellite Office in DeWitt. They said they are also looking into other locations like the Law Center large conference room for future meeting sites. Irwin said Van Lancker sent a phasing schedule to the contractor to review. Johnson said storage has been considered as some chairs and desks will need to be stored to make room in areas like the Boardroom. Johnson said the committee also recommends hiring a couple of temporary employees to help with moving furniture in the building. He said the employees would work 15-20 hours.

10:00 A.M. MET Tower/Wind Turbine Update

Chairman Irwin said a Board of Adjustment meeting was conducted last week where one weather (MET) tower was approved and a second was not due to an address change, but that application is expected to return. Irwin said they are getting a lot of information from many people. It is his understanding there are 63 different leases that have been signed. He said that is the number of parcels, not landowners. Bronson Lamp farms with his dad and uncle in Clinton County. He said farmland is decreasing every year and recently reduced by 3%. He shared concerns about how the turbine projects will affect field tiles after lines for the turbines are trenched in the ground. Irwin said imminent domain will not be a part of this project as he understands the proposals. Srp said it's his understanding that the company has a plan that would keep the transition lines to the properties that are being leased. Michelle Braswell and her husband have property on 160th Street between Petersville and Charlotte. She said one of the MET towers will be within 500 feet of their property. She said they planned to be neutral on the subject, but NextEra provided a packet of material which included a page warning people about potential physical effects that may be caused by misinformation about wind turbines. She understands the supervisors recognize they support landowner rights, and she suggests that consideration go both ways. Jen Kutsch lives on 235th Avenue near Delmar and said she would like to petition for a moratorium on the wind turbines so they have time to do their research to present to the Board. She said renewable energies may be pushing to get this done soon while incentives are still available. She owns farmland in Clinton and Jackson counties and is worried the turbines and transition lines will destroy farmland. She would like to see the farmland preserved for future generations. She's also concerned about decommissioning and the blades not being recyclable. Srp said decommissioning is an important part of the County ordinance and he will spend time reviewing. Irwin said he spoke with the County Attorney about a moratorium. He said they can only do one for 90 days and he must be able to argue the Board is working in good faith and not just putting one in place to delay or stop an action. Irwin said he doesn't anticipate this topic to be discussed weekly. He said it can be placed on the agenda when something new is presented. He said the solar applications took nine months and they started hosting meetings in Grand Mound during the evenings. Arlo Bates of the Land and Liberty Coalition said he and his organization are available to assist with ordinance language and information about renewable energy. He said the current wind ordinance is within current industry standards. James McDonald, Clinton County farmer, has worked on 16 wind farms as a truck driver. He said the sound of a blade can be heard all night long. He said the loads to bring that equipment are very heavy and will affect the County roads and he said the real damage comes from moving the cranes and other equipment. He said the local job creation is not what they say it will be. He said most of the employees come from the general contractors. He said the non-participating landowners are affected by the wind turbines and their landowner rights should also be considered. Srp said the County engineering department is leaned on heavily to review the impact on the roads. Mak Heddens, director of Power Up Iowa, a coalition of renewable energy interests, said wind leaves 98% of farmland undisturbed. Heddens said the blades of the turbines are recyclable and more manufacturers are repurposing old blades for various uses like in concrete. She said there is no link to wind turbines and human health; she cited a University of Iowa study. Heddens said the wind turbine industry employs more than 6,000 people in Iowa. She said counties experience increased economic impact while the turbines are being constructed. She said wind turbines are by far the largest taxpayer in counties where they are located. Irwin reviewed the comments written in the Zoom meeting. Irwin said ordinances can be changed after an application has been submitted. He said there were 33 changes made in the ordinance review during the application process for the solar farms. Irwin, in response to a Zoom question, said there is potential for lower property taxes. He said other counties have reported increased revenue from wind turbines producing the same amount of power that is proposed in Clinton County. Supervisor George, in response to a Zoom question, explained all electricity generated is sold to the grid and there is no control of where the power is sold. Tim Arnold, NextEra representative, confirmed that they are not

seeking a permit for a project yet and are likely more than a year away. He also stated that he supports the County reviewing its ordinance. He said the MET tower is just one part of the study they need to submit a permit. He said all landowner agreements are voluntary and is not interested in imminent domain. He said they are committed to repairing any drain tile. He said they will work with the County to determine road conditions before and after the construction and provide rehabilitation if necessary.
